

The sole purpose of this risk assessment is to support schools for all pupils in all year groups whilst at school, to <u>reduce the risk of coronavirus</u> <u>transmission</u>

- For the purpose of this risk assessment, the term 'coronavirus' to refer to coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- Schools must ensure that this risk assessment reflects the local setting and context of the school.
- Staff and unions must be consulted with regard to this risk assessment.
- This risk assessment is not exhaustive and some of the controls will be dynamic. This is issued to schools as a template to assist in the production of
 a comprehensive document that covers the particular circumstance of the setting as such, the risks and risk controls should be deleted/
 amended/ added-to to reflect the school.
- This should be viewed alongside relevant advice and guidance from the Department of Education and reflect any additional subsequent guidance issued to schools.
- When implemented in line with a revised risk assessment, these measures create an inherently safer environment for children and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced.
