

Coronavirus (COVID-19): Amendments to School Risk Assessments from 2nd March 2022

- Schools must ensure that this and all their risk assessment reflects the local setting and context of the school.
- Staff and unions must be consulted with regard to this risk assessment and any changes to existing COVID 19 risk assessments.
- The document advises of amendments that need to added/considered to existing school risk assessments, it is not exhaustive and some of the controls will be dynamic. This is issued to schools as a template to assist in the production of a full comprehensive document that covers the particular circumstance of the setting as such, the risks and risk controls should be deleted/ amended/ added-to to reflect the school.
- This should be viewed alongside relevant advice and guidance from the Department of Education and reflect any additional subsequent guidance issued to schools.
- When implemented in line with a revised risk assessment, these measures create an inherently safer environment for children and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced.
- Implementing the system of controls, creates a safer environment for pupils and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced. The way to control this virus is the same, even with the current new variants.

		Resources that are shared between classes such as sports, arts, and science equipment should be cleaned frequently. Children have been asked to come to school dressed in PE kits on the 2 days that they have PE, this will mean more time spent doing actual PE and no need for pupils to swap rooms for changing. This will also reduce the need for unnecessary belongings coming in to school.					
Face coverings	High	 There is no longer a legal requirement to wear a face covering. The government suggests that you continue to wear a face covering in crowded and enclosed spaces where you may come into contact with other people you do not normally meet. Face coverings will be reintroduced in communal areas should the school have an outbreak where social distancing between adults is not possible. A pupil has symptoms of coronavirus.	High	 Parents and carers will agree that a pupil with symptoms should not attend the school, given the potential risk to others. If a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending school, the school can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in their reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with COVID-19. The decision would need to be carefully considered in light of all the circumstances and current public health advice. Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. A pupil is tested and has a confirmed case of coronavirus.	High	A pupil that has tested positive should self-isolate In line with government advice above. Pupils, staff and other adults should follow public health advice on when to self-isolate and what to do. They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine). If anyone in your school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they should be sent home and they should follow public health advice. For everyone with symptoms, they should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household. If a pupil is awaiting collection, they should be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. Appropriate PPE should also be used if close contact is necessary. Any rooms they use should be cleaned after they have left. Individuals are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19 or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19 unless they have symptoms. 		Once the school is in operation, it is important to ensure it is well ventilated and a comfortable teaching environment is maintained.					regularly
		This is achieved by:					
		Natural ventilation – opening windows (in cooler weather windows should be opened just enough to provide constant background ventilation and opened fully during breaks to purge the air space. Opening internal doors can also assist with creating a throughput of air. Any fire doors that are kept open are done by using a dorguard that would automatically close in the case of a fire.					
		Special consideration should be taken when visitors or parents are on site.					
		CO2 monitors have been provided to all state-funded education settings, so staff can quickly identify where ventilation needs to be improved.					
Cleaning is not sufficiently comprehensive.	High	 Introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often using standard products, such as detergents. Pregnant employees	High	All employers must undertake a workplace risk assessment for their pregnant employees. There is no longer a legal requirement to wear a face covering. The government suggests that you continue to wear a face covering in crowded and enclosed spaces where you may come into contact with other people you do not normally meet. On 15 September 2021, the government announced that in England people considered to be clinically extremely vulnerable, including women who are pregnant with significant congenital or acquired heart disease, would not be advised to shield again and no further names will be added to the Shielded Patient List in England. The closure of the shielding programme followed a pause to shielding guidance in place since 1 April 2021. COVID-19 vaccines are strongly recommended in pregnancy. All pregnant women in the UK have been offered their first and second doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. All pregnant women over 18 can now book a booster vaccine 3 months after their second dose.
